
That is the number of individual first crop winners for Highlands

Powerhouse


Last year's Champion Australian 2yo

10 000 000

That is the near total in rands of current SA champion trainer Sean Tarry's lead with just under ten weeks left of the 2015-16 racing. On Champions Day his charges won a total of over R5 million – his four winners earning close to R4 million of that plunder. With Tarry's embarrassment of choices to attack the loot in the Vodacom Durban July and the Champions Cup, even that most diehard of competitors Justin Snaith may have given up the chase – although just 13 winners adrift.
