

Hayley Turner said she hoped the Queen would forgive her after Thanks Be beat royal runner Magnetic Charm in the Sandringham Stakes to end a 32-year drought for female jockeys at Royal Ascot last week. Turner, 36, was not even at primary school when Gay Kelleway became the one and only female rider to win at this meeting by landing the 1987 Queen Alexandra Stakes on Sprowston Boy. Turner admitted she had not held out too much hope that 33-1 shot Thanks Be, trained by Charlie Fellowes, would break her Royal Ascot duck. Turner quipped: "I feel bad for beating Her Majesty but I hope she will understand. I might get my OBE taken off me now."

INVINCIBLE WINX

Australian mare Winx will be covered by leading sire I Am Invincible for her first breeding season. Winx's owners announced the decision via a press release on Monday. "As owners, we have utilised and considered the expert advice of bloodstock professionals both domestically and internationally. They provided us with the foundation of information to assess and use to compile the shortlist of stallions for consideration. This process highlighted the extreme depth to the stallion ranks in Australia and across the world - however when considering the options of travelling overseas, her welfare remained the highest priority and we decided she would remain in Australia for her first breeding season," the statement said. I Am Invincible is second on the general sires list to Snitzel.

In a world where more players are falling out the bus than surviving, Milnerton trainer Piet Botha looks like making the grade. At Kenilworth on Tuesday, the Grant Behr-ridden Optimum was Botha's third winner in as many meetings and his fifth since his first runner in September, and Michael Clower reports that the former jockey's numbers have increased from 10 to 18. "I own half of them so it is not that good," he said modestly. "But people want to see results and things are now expanding a bit."

Flower Power

Wilgerbosdrift stallion Flower Alley's 6yo daughter Beach Flower outclassed her rivals when she romped to a three and a half length win in the Lady Canterbury Stakes at Canterbury Park on Saturday. She is one of 40 black type horses sired by Flower Alley thus far, with others including the Gr1 winners I'll Have Another, Lilacs And Lace, Bullards Alley and Lukes Alley. On the same afternoon at Scottsville, Mike de Kock's Alibi Guy – a son of the Gr1 Travers Stakes winner – registered his second win in two starts. Alibi Guy, who is closely inbred to Forty Niner, was a R450 000 buy from last year's National 2yo Sale. Wilgerbosdrift's well performed stallion has made a pleasing start with his first SA crop this season and Alibi Guy is one of five 2yo winners to have emerged.
